

Five Things You Might Not Know About Shutter Speed

Let's talk about shutter speed. You are likely familiar with some of the more "common knowledge" things about shutter speed:

- · Fast shutter speed stops action
- Slow shutter speed creates motion blur
- Unintended blur or shake can occur with too-slow shutter speed

Here are some lesser-discussed issues with shutter speed.

- 1. The focal length of your lens affects the outcome of the chosen shutter speed Telephoto lenses magnify both the image and the camera movement. It's more difficult to get a sharp photo on a telephoto lens. Shorter focal length lenses, which are smaller, are easier to stabilize, and handholding doesn't affect movement nearly as much (if at all.) Photographing the same subject with a 50mm lens, and a 300mm lens, using the same lighting conditions and camera settings, more blur will likely be introduced with the longer lens. You'll likely find you have to **shoot at a faster shutter speed with a longer lens** to avoid introducing unintentional blur.
- 2. The angle of subject movement relative to camera position affects the outcome of the chosen shutter speed.
 - The appearance of movement is exaggerated when that movement is perpendicular to our line of vision. Thus, you can use a **slower shutter speed when shooting moving subjects head-on**, and a **faster shutter speed when shooting subject crossing your line of vision.**
- 3. Movement is accentuated the closer your camera is to the subject that is moving

 The closer you are to the subject, the faster your shutter speed must be to stop action.

- 4. The relationship between panning and shutter speed Panning involves focusing on a moving subject and then moving the camera to follow the subject as it passes through your line of vision. The result of successful panning will be a subject that is in focus, and a blurred background. As you might suspect, the faster the subject is moving, the faster your shutter speed must be in order to get sharp focus on the subject. Following your pet romping around in the yard, you might find that a shutter speed of 1/125 is more than sufficient to stop motion. Trying to pan on a horse in a race, you'll likely need a shutter speed of 1/1000 or more.
- 5. There is a rule of thumb for helping to reduce or eliminate unintentional blur A general rule for ensuring sharp photos is **1/the focal length of your lens**. Shooting with a 50mm lens? You will likely get sharp photos at 1/50 or better. Using a 500m monster? Set your shutter speed to 1/500. These settings, of course, will affect your ISO and Aperture if you are shooting in shutter priority mode (S on a Nikon, or Tv on a Canon), so be cognizant of that fact.






