

How to Photograph a Rainbow

Now that monsoon is here, you might be seeing rainbows in our vast Cochise County sky. The *Expert Photography* has a good article on rainbow photography. Sure, when you are out and about and you see a rainbow, you can pull out your phone and hope for the best, but this article does a deep dive into the topic. The full article is linked below, but here are some highlights:

Finding Rainbows

Look for a day with clean sky and plenty of showers. The angle of the sun will affect your changes of finding a rainbow. With luck, you might catch a rainbow in the low light of the setting sun, which can amplify the colors. If you are near Carr Falls, or other waterfalls, you might see rainbows in the spray.

Double Rainbows

If you have a wide-angle lens, you might be able to get the entire rainbow – and its double. Just take care to protect your gear from rain. Inexpensive rain sleeves are available online. In a pinch, use a small trash bag.

Composition

If possible, include foreground elements into your photo, while keeping the rainbow the main focus of your image. If you can quickly move to a location where you have an unobstructed view of the entire sky, it might be worth a move.

Shooting the entire sky and its rainbow can make for a beautiful photo, but zooming in on just part of a rainbow can also bring lovely results.

Processing Rainbow Photos

If you are ready with a polarizing filter, this can help intensify the colors in the rainbow. If you are shooting from a tripod, you can later stack images and use blending to bring out the best parts of different images. Subtle use of the saturation and vibrance sliders can pump up the colors as well.

Resize your images to be **700 px** on the longest side. You can do this in Windows Photos. Open the photo in Photos. Click on the 3-dot menu, choose Resize image, and enter a dimension of 700 px on the long side. The short side will resize automatically.

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You can also resize Images in either Photoshop Elements or Photoshop, or in a native Mac application. Hit up Google for specific instructions.

Please submit no more than **four** images. (Have more? Share them at the meeting.)

If your photos represent images from the monthly Challenge, please include the challenge word in the file name.


