# Tips for Fall Photography

We are heading into fall leaf-changing season here in Cochise County, and soon Ramsey Canyon, the San Pedro River, and your neighborhoods will pop with color as leaves begin to change. When Jon and I relocated here from Illinois five years ago, I was feeling a little sad about not having fall colors. Little did I know that we have autumn down here every bit as vibrant and colorful as the Midwest or New England. If you are ready for cooler temperatures and bright fall foliage, here are some tips to help you take your best images.

- 1. Research locations and review fall foliage maps. We took a fall trip in 2022 to New England, and as I write this, we are in Colorado chasing leaves. We researched both trips online and hit the changing colors right on schedule. If we had shifted our trip by one week in either direction, we would have missed a lot of red maples in Vermont and golden aspens in Colorado. A quick Google search turned up these prime leaf-peeping spots. - **2. Watch the weather.** While fluttering red, orange, and yellow leaves against our deep blue skies are lovely, shooting on a (rare for us) overcast or misty day can produce some striking images. The dull sky can really make colors pop.
- **3.** Pay attention to the direction of light. The article suggests shooting with side light to add additional dimension to your photos. Backlit leaves can also be stunning against a dark backdrop.
- **4. Use a fast shutter speed.** Check your images in the field zoom in on your camera's screen to make sure your leaves are blurred from wind.
- **5. Look for reflections.** Seeing those gorgeous colors reflected in a creek, pond, or even a puddle can add an exciting dimension to your images.


